

Monday (Oct 27 <sup>th</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Joshua 15:20-63</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. What four administrative areas was Judah divided into? Why do you think so much detail is given to Judah's allotment? (ref. Gen. 49:8-12)</li> <li>2. What is significant about Judah's inability to dislodge the Jebusites? Who was able to conquer Jerusalem and unite the kingdom at this royal city? (ref. 1Sa 5:6-12)? Why might this knowledge be important for us today?</li> <li>3. What people management and match-making principles do you see in Caleb's ministry? Are there any which are applicable to a situation you are facing?</li> </ol>
Tuesday (Oct 28 <sup>th</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Joshua 16:1-10</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. How would you compare the size of Joseph and Judah's allotment of land? How was their land allotment a fulfillment of both God's promise to Jacob and Jacob's blessing of them (ref. Gen. 28:10-19; 48:19-20)?</li> </ol>
Wednesday (Oct 29 <sup>th</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Joshua 17:1-13</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. What sour note was recorded in Ephraim and Manasseh's inheritance? What would you have wanted to do about either situation if you were their tribal leader?</li> <li>2. What was so unusual about the request made by the daughters of Zelophehad? Why did Joshua grant their request?</li> <li>3. Is there an area where you need to stand up for your rights? How will you do this in a helpful way?</li> </ol>
Thursday (Oct 30 <sup>th</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Joshua 17:14-18</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. What problems, both external and internal, will the people of Joseph have to overcome if they are to possess all the land Joshua has given them? With which of those problems can you identify?</li> <li>2. How do you feel when you see a promise of God coming true in your life? Describe an instance where this has happened.</li> <li>3. If you are dissatisfied or incomplete in any way, what is God calling you to do about it?</li> </ol>
Friday (Oct 31 <sup>st</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Joshua 18:1-10</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Why was Joshua impatient with seven of the tribes when they all gathered in Shiloh? What action did he take to deal with the problem?</li> </ol>

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>2. What instructions did Joshua give the surveyors he sent out? Why do you think these surveyors were appointed from each tribe? Would you have volunteered to be one of them?</li> </ol>
Saturday (Nov 1 <sup>st</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Joshua 18:11-28</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Benjamin was first to receive its allotment of land under Joshua's lottery system. Why was its territory important? What towns in its territory played an important role in Israel's history?</li> <li>2. Who were the famous biblical people that came from Benjamin (ref. 1Sam.9:1; Est. 2:5; and Rom. 11:1)?</li> </ol>
Sunday (Nov 2 <sup>nd</sup> )	<p><b><u>Scripture: Psalm 73</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The problem of the prosperity of the ungodly oppressed the psalmist. See verses 2, 13, 16. Real life seemed to mock the assertion of verse 1. What was the root of the psalmist's distress? See verses 3, 22 (ref. Pr.23:17; Ps.37:1). What is the <i>more excellent way</i>? (ref. 1Cor.13:4; 1Pet.2:1).</li> <li>2. How did the psalmist discover the dreadfulness of his error? What did he come to see with regard to the wicked (verses 17-20), and what did he find that he possessed in God? (verses 23-26)? Can you honestly and enthusiastically make the confession of verse 25?</li> <li>3. What can we learn from the psalmist's example (a) in verses 15-17 and (b) in verse 28? Do you delight in being near to God, and in speaking not of doubts (verse 15), but of God's mighty works?</li> </ol>
