

Monday (Nov 3 rd)	<p><u>Scripture: Joshua 19:1-51</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Where was Simeon’s inheritance in relationship to the other tribes? How was this inheritance a fulfillment of Jacob’s blessing (ref. Gen. 49:5-7)? 2. Is there anything in the description of the other tribal allotments that strikes you as interesting? What are you curious about, that the text omits? 3. What did the tribes have to do (v.47) to fully realize the blessing that was theirs by survey work, chance allotment, and divine prophecy? 4. What is significant about Joshua getting what he asked for? 5. Where are you experiencing difficulty in taking possession of your rightful inheritance from Christ? What is holding you back from claiming the victory that is yours in Christ?
Tuesday (Nov 4 th)	<p><u>Scripture: Joshua 20:1-9</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. How did a person find safety in a place of refuge? Why were they set up (ref. Ex. 21:13; Nu. 35:6-15)? 2. What modern principles of justice do you see in this? 3. Where or whom do you turn to when you feel you’re in a crisis?
Wednesday (Nov 5 th)	<p><u>Scripture: Joshua 21:1-7</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Why did the family heads of the Levites approach Eleazar and Joshua at Shiloh? What basis did they have for their claim (ref. Nu. 35:1-8)? 2. Who were the Levites? How were they divided up? What was unique about the Kohathites (ref. Nu. 3)? 3. What part of your life is God calling you to share with someone else right now? How about your group?
Thursday (Nov 6 th)	<p><u>Scripture: Joshua 21:18-45</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Do you think the other tribes had any objections to the plan of giving cities from their territories to Levites? Why or why not? 2. In verses 43-45 what did the Lord give to Israel? What aspects of God’s nature shine through these gifts to Israel? 3. Can you honestly say from your experience, “Not one of the Lord’s promises to me has failed”?

Friday (Nov 7 th)	<p><u>Scripture: Joshua 22:1-9</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. What did Joshua say to the Reubenites, Gadites, and half-tribe of Manasseh that would have made their ears burn? What challenge did he give them? Why are both affirmation and exhortation important for God’s people? 2. Is there someone near and dear to you, from who you may soon be parted? What kind of things do you need to say to that person by way of encouragement or challenge?
Saturday (Nov 8 th)	<p><u>Scripture: Joshua 22:10-34</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. When finally given a chance to explain themselves (verses 21-29), what reason did the Reubenites, Gadites, and half-tribe of Manasseh give for building this altar? How was it to be a positive, not a negative, influence? 2. How did Phinehas, the leaders of the community, and the rest of Israel each respond to this explanation? What might have happened to Israel had they not taken the time to find out the facts? 3. If someone were to say to you, “You have no share in the Lord,” How would you react? What principles of conflict resolution, taken and learnt from the story, would you use to defend yourself?
Sunday (Nov 9 th)	<p><u>Scripture: Psalm 74</u></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. consider the psalmist’s survey and summary of Israel’s shattering defeat (verses 1-11); and how he then reminds himself that God is Creator, Redeemer, and King (verses 12-17). As a Christian, can you face disaster and discomfort with such an assurance about God? (Ref. Rom. 8:18,28) 2. Note the boldness and the persistence of the psalmist’s requests. See verses 2, 3, 10, 11, 18-23. What is the basis of his confidence? Have you learnt thus to plead in prayer both for church and nation? Note the reasons the psalmist give why God should answer.

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
